But Jesus immediately redirects their thinking: "Do not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life". As he had earlier invited the woman at the well to accept the living water only he could provide, Jesus now invites the crowd to accept the bread of life he offers. Both the water from the well and the barley loaves can nourish us for only a short time; Jesus can satisfy our hunger and thirst for eternity.
